

A steep roof over their heads

Housing is taking bigger bite of income


Nearly a quarter of working households in Massachusetts and across the United States spend more than half their income on housing, according to a study released yesterday by the Washington, D.C.-based Center for Housing Pokey.

More than 231,000 M assachusetts households, or 24 percent of working families, suffered from a "severe housing cost burden" of spending more than 30 percent of their income on housing in 2010, up from 22 percent in 2009, according to the center, which based its analysis on recent census data.

Nationwide, the percentage of working households that spent more than half their income on housing grew to 23.6 percent in 2010, up from 22.8 percent in 2009, the

The report emphasizes what many working people know firsthand: They are increasingly struggling to keep a roof over their heads and cover other expenses. The task is even harder for many tenants, who have seen rents rise despite the sluggish economy and high tunemployment rate, the report said.

"In Greater Boston we are seeing huge challenges in rents rising at the same time that incomes are stagnating," said Sean Caron, director of public policy at the Boston-based affordable housing nonprofit, Citizens' Housing and Planning Association. "Working





