State Distributions for CPA Announced

In November, the <u>Department of Revenue announced a</u>
19% match to <u>CPA communities</u> from the state's
Community Preservation Trust Fund. Advocates were
concerned the match would reach a record low of about
14% this year, but a \$10 million infusion from the state's
budget surplus resulted in a slight increase from last year's
distribution.

Federal Updates

CHAPA Submits "Public Charge" Comments

On December 10, <u>CHAPA submitted a letter</u> opposing the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) proposed <u>"Public Charge" rule change</u>. DHS uses the public charge rule to determine if low-income immigrants are allowed to enter or stay in the U.S. based on whether they are "likely to become primarily dependent on the government for subsistence" or not. The proposed change would affect households applying for or receiving federal public

Federal Budget Funded through December 21

On December 7, <u>Congress and the President avoided a</u>
<u>partial government shutdown</u> that would have affected
HUD programs by agreeing to a second continuing
resolution, funding the government for two more weeks.

CHAPA Submits Comments on Community Reinvestment Act

CHAPA submitted a letter to the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC) on November 19th in response to the office's Advanced Notice of Proposed Rulemaking for the Community Reinvestment Act (CRA). This is a first step in what is likely to be at least a yearlong process for CRA reform. While the OCC has initiated the regulatory review process, the Federal Reserve Board and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation also regulate the CRA.



Recent Research

MCBC Releases Annual Mortgage Lending Report

In its 25th annual report, the Massachusetts Community and Banking Council (MCBC) offers information on patterns of mortgage lending in the City of Boston, Greater Boston, Massachusetts, and thirty-six large cities and towns.

NYC Reports on First Year of Right-to-Counsel Law

New York City was the first U.S. city to pass right-tocounsel for low-income tenants in housing court. A new report shows that in the first year, nearly <u>22,000 residents</u> (<u>7,800 households</u>) threatened with eviction were able to

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remain in their homes after securing legal representation.

Freddie Mac's Insights on Inadequate Housing Supply

Freddie Mac found the <u>U.S. economy is about 2.5 million</u> housing units short of meeting long-term demand. In fact, from 1968 to 2008, there was only one year in which fewer new housing units were built than in 2017, despite rising demand in a growing economy.

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
