# Coronavirus State & Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (CSLFRF)

Brookline's allocation of federal funds is \$32,406,450

Potential allocation from Norfolk County is \$11,466,154

- We have our ½ allotment and are actively investing it \$16,203,225
- We are developing an on-line portal for transparency and accountability

Deadlines:

For spending starting in March 2021

Funds must be obligated by December 31, 2024.

The period of performance will run until December 31, 2026, which will provide recipients a reasonable amount of time to complete projects funded with Fiscal Recovery Funds

# Project Types / Process Categories

## **Non-Discretionary**

COVID response, grant administration and transparency. Projects under this category will be subject to the Town Administrator's approval.

## **Government services**

Restoration of COVID cuts, new departmental initiatives. Projects under this category will undergo review, final approval by Select Board.

## **Community initiatives**

Determine feasibility and cost, further review by relevant Board Commission or Committee, final approval by Select Board.

# How Do We Begin?

- Select Board provides policy guidance for community engagement
- Department Heads provide expertise
  - Working groups to study / collaborate on requests
- Residents, Boards and Commissions help perform engagement efforts / assist with prioritization
- OpenGov tool will help facilitate requests and provide transparency





# Types of Community Engagement

- Use an engagement expert –
  - Likely Brookline Community Foundation
- Conduct a range of community engagement events/activities
  - Charette to provide broad overview
  - Survey to assess community's priorities
  - Forums
  - Social media
- Utilize community feedback
- What priorities has town meeting agreed on?

Budget development tied to existing process





## This Is Bigger Than Town Government

- **Partner with the Brookline Community Foundation** to lead the Town's efforts to reach households most impacted by COVID and the organizations that work with them. The BCF is well positioned in the community to lead and coordinate these strategies.
- **Enlist the support of key organizations and groups** that are comprised of or work directly with those most impacted by COVID to get their views on three things:
  - The Town's engagement plan,
  - Their willingness and ability help with community engagement, and
  - Thoughts on the community's needs.



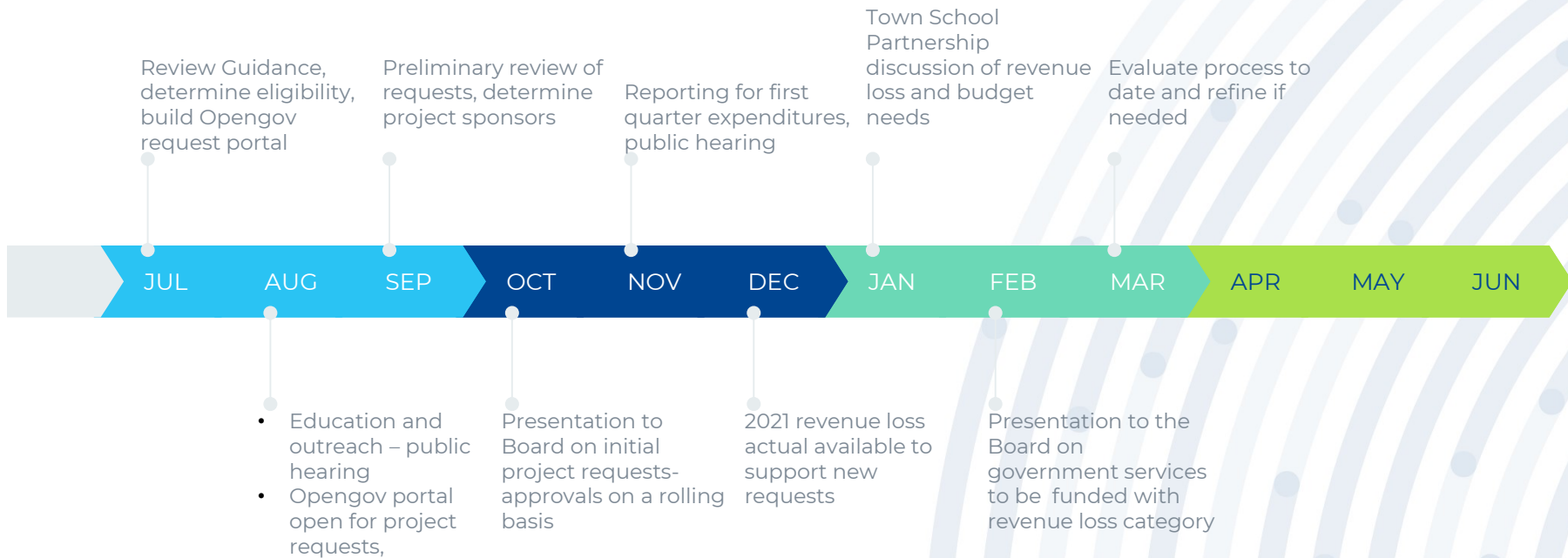
## ● **Town Process**

- Project updates provided at Select Board meetings
- Proposed use of funds to mirror CDBG and/ or existing budget process
- Project specific proposals with spending timelines identified and performance measures in place to support the program
- Project details updated in Opengov

# Community Process

- Notify community groups via email about programming
- Focus on people most impacted by COVID-19
- Coalesce to organize funding requests
- Make sure that people appreciate the import of funds
- Organize applications –
  - What are resident's priorities
  - How to apply (Opengov tutorial)
- Align with town process and schedule

- Increased home ownership among lower income
- Lbs. of fossil fuels eliminated from businesses and homes
